The May 2005, Spring Garden Tour is what prompted Jeanne Yale to join the Laguna Beach Garden Club. She enjoyed the tour, and wanted a little more information. She knew two things – the club put on a wonderful garden tour and they marched in the Patriot's Day Parade. Consequently she attended the September meeting, and as they say 'the rest is history.'

She has enjoyed gardening for almost as long as she can remember. She recalls in grade school being amazed that a few beans placed in a jar with a wet paper towel could unfold into complete leafy plants within a short week. Her parents who, viewed gardening not only as a pleasant pastime, but also as a means to supplement the family meals with fresh produce also nurtured her love of gardening.

Born in Nebraska, the youngest of three (an older brother and sister), the family moved to Boston, and finally to Claremont, California. This pleasant college town was situated in the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains surrounded by orange groves. It was those orange groves that were the inspiration for her collection of orange crate labels, many of which are from those very Clare-

mont packinghouses near where she grew up.

She graduated from the University of Redlands with a degree in English and shortly thereafter married her high-school sweetheart, Michael. Before long they moved to Long Beach, where Jeanne worked as a legal secretary for a tax attorney before her children were born. She has a daughter Laura now 19 who attends Colorado College in Colorado Springs, and a son Brian who is 15 and a sophomore at Laguna Beach High School.

The Yale family moved to Laguna Beach in November of 1993, shortly after the fire. To get the "lay of the land" they first rented a home in Bluebird Canyon for about a year before settling into their present home in Woods Cove. Shortly before moving into that rental house, Michael was leaving Laguna after picking up the key—when he noticed a plume of smoke in his rearview mirror, fortunately the fire didn't reach Bluebird Canyon.

Their new home was built in 1928 and needed quite a bit of work, especially the yard; it consisted of mostly ivy, bare dirt and many very large trees. Although she had always planted lots of annuals and other sun loving plants, Jeanne tackled the biggest challenge—too much shade, by

experimenting with the interesting colors and textures that are found in the foliage of so many of the shade plants. She has also become quite fond of the hardier drought tolerant plants, which she has planted in the drier and sunnier sections of her yard bordering the street.

But she says, "*Probably my favorite thing is growing vegetables.*" A large raised bed in the sunniest corner of the yard proves her 'farming genes' are strong. Alongside the tomatoes, zucchini and other summer favorites that she plants each spring, there is an enviable asparagus bed she planted about 10 years ago and it is still going strong.

Among the many projects in which she participated in her first year are, last year's Garden Tour, and mailing the newsletters out every month. She is a willing volunteer and the club is very lucky to have Jeanne Yale as the newest member of the board. Jeanne's previous career as a legal secretary makes her the perfect choice to be our new corresponding secretary.

*"I've enjoyed being a member of the garden club. The meetings are always fun and informative, and it's nice to spend time with people who share your passion for plants"* concludes Jeanne.

The Plant Table revenue at last month's Membership Coffee was a record high of **\$265**.


Gloria truly sees the glass half full and endless possibilities for what might sell on that plant table. She loves garage sales and she

Good job Gloria!





2. If you donated a plant, check the table 10 minutes after the meeting is over. If your plant has not sold, please take it home. Gloria can nurse only so many.
3. Any size bouquet of fresh flowers from your garden will sell in a minute.
4. Please bring clean items only.
5. Unique, vintage and upscale items sell best.
