President's Message Summer and Sunny Days Ahead

Happy Summer, everyone! I send my greetings and best wishes to all of you and hope you are enjoying these warm days and sunny, blue skies.

As you know from our June newsletter. "Education in the *Garden*" is my focus for the club for the next two years. And, "education" and the "garden" are my personal working themes this summer. In a time of great uncertainty, I am learning how to fill my days while at home by trying new things in my garden and in the kitchen. Plus, the biggest new excitement in my household has been adopting a three-year old rescue Yorkie Poodle and learning the joys of puppy dog love — but more on that later!



Here's something new I've tried in my garden: milkweed.

Milkweed is the plant on which Monarch butterflies lay their eggs. If you get the chance, check out Susie Vanderlip's informative presentations on YouTube on Monarch butterflies. Several weeks ago, I watched one of them and began an adventure to add color and butterflies to my garden. It's been very interesting and a life lesson.



While I was at Plant Depot purchasing milkweed, a

Monarch butterfly started following me around as I carried the plant -- and proceeded to lay half-a-dozen eggs on it one at a time! That milkweed is now in my yard, and caterpillars have appeared on the leaves. My husband and I are still waiting for the butterflies to emerge. Meanwhile, we've enjoyed seeing several gorgeous Monarch butterflies flutter through our yard every day such a treat! I have also learned that California native milkweed is best for our Monarch butterflies — and for our regional environment. The non-native tropical varieties of milkweed plants must be cut back every year to prevent a protozoan parasite that is harmful to Monarchs from living on the plant.

Here are some new things I've tried in the kitchen:

Hopefully, many of you are enjoying fresh fruits and vegetables from your gardens (or in my case the store). Right now, my garden has just one lemon tree and a rosemary plant -- but I am using them in fruit and vegetable dishes. Recently, I prepared cauliflower steaks with cilantro sauce, and it was delicious. The fresh lemon juice in that dish came from the lemons on my tree. The recipe is in the box on the next page.

This summer, my favorite thing to eat has to be waffles with a berry and peach compote that we enjoyed recently. The compote is simply fresh berries (I used blackberries and raspberries) and a nice ripe peach. The peach provided all the sweetness and juice we needed.

Summer Recipe Grilled Cauliflower Steak With Cilantro Sauce

Serves 4

¼ cup olive oil	Cilantro Sauce
1 teaspoon cumin seeds	2 cups roughly chopped cilantro
1 teaspoon minced garlic	1/2 cup mint leaves
¼ teaspoon chili flakes	¼ cup lemon juice
¼ teaspoon ground turmeric	1 serrano chile
1 large head cauliflower cut into steaks	1 teaspoon salt
Pinch of salt	¾ cup olive oil

Prepare barbecue (medium-high heat). In a small saucepan, heat ¼ cup olive oil until shimmering. Bloom cumin seeds (until the cumin seeds open up) in olive oil and immediately follow with minced garlic. When cumin seeds and garlic begin to color, stir in chill flakes and turmeric. Cool oil slightly. Meanwhile, season cauliflower "steaks" with salt. Brush steaks on both sides with the infused cumin-garlic-chili oil. Grill cauliflower steaks over direct heat or in oven grill pan for about 4 minutes on each side or until charred in places and almost tender. For cilantro sauce, place all ingredients in a blender and puree until smooth. Serve sauce over grilled cauliflower or on the side.

Next year, I will take on the challenge of coordinating the Gate & Garden Tour for 2021. Please come help out; it would be wonderful to have your assistance. It's a great





A highlight of our monthly meeting for many is the **Plant Table**. Members could shop and acquire garden items that another member no longer needed. These items range from pottery, plant cuttings, baskets, books on gardening, and decorative garden treasures just to name a few.

This new feature of the *Weeders Digest* provides an opportunity for members to offer significantly valuable garden-related items for sale to other members via posts in our future editions. The item(s) must be such that a buyer will take the trouble to drive to your home, pick up the item, and pay a fair "plant table" price. Following the transaction you, the seller, are expected to forward the revenue to the Club. The revenue will be used to offset the club's expenses.

Our first posts:

USED GARDEN WALL BRICKS – Small interlocking garden wall bricks that retail for about \$2.50 each. They are four inches thick, one foot wide, and are used to construct small retaining walls up to three feet high. Fifty cents each. Contact Norman Powell 499-1487.



USED RAIN BARRELS – Two 55 gallon plastic barrels to collect rooftop rainwater. Hardware supplied with the barrel taps into the downspout from the rain gutters.
