Mr. Borthwick received the
Harry Lawrence Award in 2015
from the Laguna Beach
Beautification Council, and the
American Society of Landscape
Architects Public Stewardship
Award in 2016 for his pro-bono
work in preserving Aliso Creek



and Laguna Creek. Laguna
Beach projects include the
recent DeWitt Property / Laguna
Creek restoration in Laguna
Canyon, Alta Laguna Park, and
portions of Heisler Park, among
others.


We look forward to his presentation at our first meeting.

Hortense Miller's Home

A HIDDEN LAGUNA TREASURE NEEDS YOUR HELP



nlike Laguna's art festivals, theatre and art museum, the iconic mid-century home and the 2.5 acre wild, hillside gardens of the late Hortense Miller aren't visible, or even accessible, to most Laguna locals or visitors without a reservation. Most visitors fall in love at first sight with the house, the furniture, the artwork and the grounds that all once belonged to one of Laguna's legendary figures. And as the Hortense Miller Garden property attracts more visitors. its upkeep and special events need more help.


The Friends of Hortense Miller Garden are actively seeking experienced volunteers to head several specific efforts. The last Open House attracted over 280 visitors in 2019. There is a wonderful and dedicated group



of volunteers, but with interest in mid-century architecture, native gardening and crafts renaissance booming, more help is needed, particularly anyone with experience in planning and managing special events for other nonprofits, QuickBooks expertise, or social media/ marketing. In addition to the organization's Open House, the group also hosts art workshops, exhibitions of local artists and meditation retreats and weekly house and garden tours of the property.

The current special exhibit in the Aviary Gallery

explores the history of the *Friends of the Hortense Miller Garden*, from its earliest beginnings in 1977 as a group of volunteers dedicated to fulfilling
Hortense's desire to make the Garden a perpetual refuge for



both wild things and for people as a public garden. Nature also challenged the commitment of the Friends when the December 1979 Boat Canyon Fire raged

through the Garden, taking with it much of the work they had done. Led by Ginny Worthington, the volunteers sprang into action immediately, taking cues from Hortense's attitude of respect towards the fire. The Garden grew back in abundance; the fire had released dormant poppy fields and other native plants. Much of the research for the exhibit was done with great curiosity and enthusiasm by Barbara Deubert: without her



commitment this exhibit would not have happened. Working with Barbara was Kristy Melita, who continued the project and received original slides, photos and artwork from the estate of Ginny Worthington. These items were incorporated into the exhibit with the help of Michele Leighton and Cheryl Michelon.

A native of St. Louis, Hortense



moved to Laguna Beach in 1953 and died in 2008 just shy of her 100th birthday. A lifelong writer, ferocious gardener and talented craftsperson, she was straightforward, unpretentious and feisty in her philosophy about gardening, politics, love and life in general. Although the property has been owned by Laguna Beach since 1977 when Hortense bequeathed it to the City, it is managed and cared for by a volunteer Board that must annually raise funds to repair and maintain the house as well as the more than 800 species of plants and trees that fill the dozens of slope side paths.

Madame Ganna Walska, a well-known Polish opera singer and socialite, purchased the estate in 1941 and spent the next 43 years creating Lotusland, which is now recognized as one of the ten best gardens in the world. The 37-acre garden is a spectacular collection of exotic plants. After

her death in 1984, Lotusland became a non-profit foundation and opened to the





public in 1993.

Prior to arriving at the gardens for our appointment, our bus driver found a lovely spot at Chase Palm Park near downtown Santa Barbara for us to enjoy our lunches, followed by time to stroll on the pier or State Street to stretch our legs. Upon arrival we broke up into small groups and followed the map of the garden to explore at our leisure as much of the garden

A Monarch Butterfly Garden in Laguna Beach

During the consent calendar on Tuesday (August 10), Laguna Beach City Council will consider establishing a monarch butterfly and pollinator garden in Heisler Park, which includes planting of native milkweed plants and installation of an educational sign. If approved, the action

will also direct staff to work with volunteers for coordination and planting.

Laguna Beach Garden Club has agreed to donate the informational signage and provide the initial native milkweed plants.

"The purpose of the garden is to spread public awareness about the endangered monarch butterflies and allow the public to view the butterflies," the staff report explains.

The proposed special habitat for North America's arguably most beloved butterfly was presented at a Recreation Committee meeting on June 7. Committee members unanimously supported the proposal, saying it's non-invasive, usable, achievable.

"Who could be against

butterflies?" committee member Anna Cathleen Greiner said at the June meeting.

Volunteers hope to create a butterfly garden and conservation sanctuary for monarch butterflies in an approximately 200-square-foot area at the park, on a sloped space slightly inland of the whale sculpture.

A pollinator garden would fit in nicely in the area, said Laura Ford, local resident and founder of Pollinator Protection Fund of Laguna Beach (a nonprofit formally organized earlier this year), when she presented the idea to the Recreation Committee in June.

The slightly sloped space was chosen because it already has irrigation, is in need of some more planting, and is a good location for interaction with the public, explained Laura Ford.
