

He has landscaped homes in the La **Iolla and South Orange County** areas including his own small-scale patio gardens to provide sustenance for the local pollinator populations.

Having grown up in New England before moving to Southern California, Tom has been gardening since he can remember. He began designing gardens while he was involved with his passion for training and riding horses as a dressage instructor. He enhanced his education in landscape design by attending classes locally to better develop his knowledge and understanding of how to use native plants to enhance gardens.

Tom recently started his own company called *Navito Landscape Designs* and is moving forward to complete his design credentials and working with clients.



SEED SAVING WORKSHOP

The Ecology Center (32701 Alipaz Street, San Juan Capistrano) is offering a Seed Saving Workshop on October 16 from 10 am to 1 pm. Registration is required prior to the workshop; fees can be found on The Ecology Center website: https://the-ecology-center.ticketleap.com/workshop-seed-saving/

Participants will learn about the rich tradition of seed-saving and spend time in the expansive field at the Ecology Center collecting seeds from the center's latest harvest. Growing and collecting seeds for future crops used to be an important part of all farming practices. These cultivated seeds developed varieties of strong and diverse plants. However, with the rise of industrialized



agriculture came to loss of genetic diversity in crops and the knowledge needed to produced exceptional seed



During the workshop, attendees will learn all aspects about crop seed, plant life cycles, seed saving techniques, and equipment and terminology important to understanding seed-saving. The workshop will end with a end with a community seed swap, so think twice before you throw your excess produce into the compost bin.

Southern California Vegetable Planting Chart by Greg Alder

Greg Alder, our speaker for March 2022, has created a single-page chart that shows the best planting months for the most common vegetables, making it easier to see the whole planting year at a glance. It can be a single piece of paper to pin up as an easy reference.

Although there are other charts available about planting, he wanted one based on results he has observed in his own garden and others in the Southern California regions. The chart shows the best, most reliable months in which to plant each vegetable; although there is wiggle room, for example, if frost doesn't happen in your region then February is fine to start tomatoes.

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Scott Daigre from **Tomatomania** will be our speaker in January. I subscribe to his newsletter. Here are some tips he offers for fall planting and preparing for spring.

Fall is prime time for lettuce, radishes, beets, shallots, arugula, chard, carrots, etc. Coast Hardware has donated seed packets, which will be available at the **October 8 meeting** for you to take home.

Prepare for spring now this fall.

- 1. **Compost** make your own by piling up leaves, grass clippings, or whatever you have available. Wet it and turn it occasionally. Decomposition happens so that by spring you will have broken-down organics. It will help your garden by leaps and bounds.
- 2. **Cover Crops** are easy beneficial and often pretty. A great idea if you aren't going to plant a fall garden. Legumes, grains, vetch (scrambling herbaceous plant of the pea family), clover, and other green covers collect nitrogen from the air and trap it in the roots below. This builds soils area a busy garden season.
- 3. **Leaves** collect them, mulch with them, shred them if you can. Pile them all over your quiet summer garden or in a new area for cultivation next spring. During spring turn these into the soil to provide nutrients for your spring plants.

Seed Sharing: "Librarians have become farmers, or least farming midwives, since 2004 when the Hudson Valley Seed Library sprouted the Gardiner (NY) Public Library. Since then free seed-sharing programs have opened across the country, specializing in heirloom or uniquely local flowers, vegetables, and other plants. The idea [is] to teach people about regional flora, expand seed access and help preserve biodiversity."

Tool Time: "Need a saw hammer, weed whacker or unusual screwdriver? The Berkley (CA) Public Library's Tool Lending Library is one of the oldest in the country, recently branching into kitchen tools, dehydrators, Instant Pots, ice cream makers and more." Plant People – series Plant PPL by LA Times Aug 25, 2021

The *LA Times*, Saturday section, often has articles about plants. This article features 20 young people who are nicknamed Plant People (or Plant PPL) who are Plant Influencers (who knew that was a thing?) on Instagram. The LA Times interviewed them to feature their best plant care tips and gardening advice. I thought I would select a few for each our Newsletters.

- *Courtney Warwick* from Long Beach, CA: 1. Less is always best. Under watering is always better than too much and helps to avoid root rot. 2. **Wipe your plants leaves.** Dust can block the sunlight, which can prevent photosynthesis. Try this biweekly.
- James Monroe: 1. Basic soil for succulents. Succulents need soil that drains well. Try this simple mixture of cactus mix, pumice or perlite, and earthworm castings. 2. Soil moisture & pot openings. The amount of space that succulents fill in the opening of a pot will alter the evaporation and affects how long the soil will retain water. Opening filled completely does not afford much space for evaporation; soil will remain wet longer. Some space

available allows for evaporation; soil stays moderately wet. Open space allows soil to dry the quickest. Check out his website for more tips: www.unknownsucculents.com

• *Ken Sparks* – known as The Farmer Ken in South LA: 1. When planting **fruit trees that**

typically grow in distinct winters (apples, peaches, nectarines, pears, cherries, etc.) in our warm climate, keep in mind chill hours (hours below 45 degrees). Grow low-chill cultivars of these plants. Favorites are Anna apple, Golden Dorsett apple, Florida Prince peach, and Panamint nectarine. 2. Fruit trees are either self-pollinating (produces pollen on its own) or require a second tree for pollination. The Anna apple is self-pollinating but if there is another self-pollinating tree nearby even if it's a different variety, the yield of fruit will increase drastically. If only



purchasing one tree, make sure it's self-pollinating. Email: <u>FarmerKenOfficial@gmail.com</u> *Submitted by: Lynn Jax*

Blueberry Oatmeal Breakfast Bars/Cakes

Gluten free, dairy free, healthy, and easy.

Ingredients:

- 1 cup whole oats
- 1 cup oat flour (oat flour can be made by grinding 1 cup of oats to food processor)
- ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- ½ cup almond/oat milk (any type of milk can be used)
- 2 eggs
- ½ cup melted butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup fresh blueberries (can substitute frozen blueberries)
- ½ cup chopped nuts (walnuts, pecans, almonds your choice)
- 1/3 cup shredded coconut (Optional)

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 8-inch square pan or a muffin tin.
- 2. Combine whole oats, oat flour, brown sugar, salt, & baking soda together in a bowl.
- 3. Stir in almond/oat milk, eggs, butter, vanilla extract until well combined.
- 4. Fold in blueberries and nuts.
- 5. Spread mixture into prepared pan & top with shredded coconut (if using)
 - **OR** Fill greased muffin tin space about ³/₄ full.
- 6. Bake in preheated oven until edges are golden brown:

For Square pan: Bake 35 minutes & coconut is brown.

For Muffin tin: Bake for 20 minutes & edges are golden brown.

7. Cool in pan or muffin tin for 10 minutes before cutting into squares or removing from muffin tin.
