



President's Message

A New Season and A New President

elcome back to our 94th year of operation! After the privations of CoVid, we have come roaring back with our most successful Gate and Garden Tour ever. We have made donations to multiple organizations in town, some of which include the replanting and maintenance of The Presbyterian Church rose garden, a vegetable garden for the residents of Glenwood House, and a pollinator garden in Bluebird Canyon Park.

And now to our upcoming year. My theme is "Responsible Gardening in a Changing World" and there is no denying the reality of climate change. I am writing this from my little house in Burgundy, France where we have had record breaking heat and are in a drought. Fires still rage along the West coast of Europe and in the South, and glaciers are melting at record speeds.



Meanwhile at home, the West coast is in a record mega drought and a 3rd successive La Niña is forecast for this winter. There is no more fire season: it is now a year round problem. Laguna is high risk especially because of limited ingress and egress. So, what can we do? Our panel of speakers this year have been selected to address some of these issues. In October we are going



to hear about the fire mitigation plan for the city and how we might decrease fire risk in our own gardens. Subsequently Nan Sterman is coming to speak about water wise irrigation. Our world is changing and we must adapt accordingly.

Does this mean we have to give up on beautiful blooming gardens? Of course not, but we must plant and maintain more realistically. I grew up gardening in Ireland where you could put a stick in the ground and it would bloom in a week. However, from my first day at med school in 1967 until I retired in 2019, there was no time. Over the past 3 years I have been learning a

completely different method. I had my steep slope terraced and I replanted with California natives, put in a drip irrigation system, and am trying to set up a smart timer for it. Natives are not limited to spring blooming: with care, you can find plants that will have bloom or foliage throughout the year. I am almost to the point where in summer I will need to water once a month at most! However, in the interest of full disclosure I must confess that I still have a small rose garden: I just have 6 bushes in a narrow curving bed and they are well mulched!

I can't wait for our new club season and to seeing you all again! I promise I will do my best to say tomaato and not tomahto......

September Speaker

Artist Matt Willey

For the Good of the Hive



att Willey started on his journey seven years ago when a honey bee flew into his studio in Manhattan. The bee lay on the floor, and Matt lay down and joined it, and spent 2 hours absolutely transfixed by the beautiful and complicated nature of this little creature. The bee died, but it awoke a curiosity in Matt that lived on and sent him on a journey to find out more.

Matt started to discover the parallels between bees and humans. He discovered the complexity of how the hive works and is in complete synchronicity with nature. Matt says, "they are a symbol of change, a symbol of a sense of purpose and a sense of collective togetherness. Humans need more of that right now."

Matt made it his mission to paint 50,000 bees around the world and he launched a movement and organization called 'The Good of the Hive'. He's reached about 10% of this target so far and completed 27 murals from the Smithsonian's National Zoo to Burts Bees headquarters and many other projects in between. If you're a bee enthusiast, you'll know that 50,000 is roughly how many bees it takes to make a hive.



Humans could certainly learn a lot from bees. It's almost beyond our capability to understand the importance of pollinators as a whole to the ecosystem. Bee species (and other pollinators) are becoming extinct, (right now 35 bee species face extinction and 71% of our butterflies are in decline - Soil Association) and with them whole swathes of plant species will follow. In the end, without pollinators we will cease to be able to grow crops and many

grow crops and many plant species will disappear. It is estimated that it would cost UK farmers £1.8 billion a year to manually pollinate their crops (Soil Association), not to mention the time and energy this would

take. In China they are already seeing this have an effect and are unsuccessfully trying to replicate the work of the pollinators.

Whilst we think humans are so important to the planet, quite the reverse is true. We are vastly outnumbered by insects, who really act as the engine to nature. Matt says, "I use the hive as a metaphor, but it's really us I'm painting".

Dee Perry Honored as Woman of the Year

n June 17, 2022, the Women's Club of Laguna Beach named **Dee Perry** as the 2022 Woman of Year.

A variety of factors go into what makes a Women of the Year candidate, such as resilience in the face of adversity and leading change within the community. This describes Dee Perry. She has taught elementary school in Laguna Beach for 37 years, retiring early on the advice of her doctor after being diagnosed with breast cancer to reduce stress. However, she chose to fill her "free time" with many community organizations. She is serving her second term on the Laguna Beach Unified Board of Education, has been a member of the Garden Club since 2010, volunteers as a docent for Laguna Art Museum. She also serves on the Crystal Cove Council, the Board of the Women's Club, and as a panelist for art grants for the State of California Arts Council. In addition, she volunteers at the school gardens



of Laguna Beach and at San Joaquin Marsh and Wildlife in Irvine. Dee is also president of the Career and College Advantage Board that strives to offer students courses in career fields, including law, medicine, and construction trades while earning college credits.

She is known as a fierce advocate for students and parents. She worked as a special education teacher and a speech pathologist, and pushed for English as Second Language programs. As a single mother, Dee also fostered two children, who credit her with teaching them the keys to accomplishing an objective. To describe Dee, many of the speakers at the luncheon made references to a quote from Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream-"Though she be but little, she is fierce."

The Hawaiian theme of the celebration was selected by Dee because her grandmother took her on a trip to Hawaii in 1965 in her early adolescent years. She embraced the Hawaiian culture and meaning of family (Ohana), giving thanks for those attendees from the many different group she belongs, giving gratitude to her book club and hiking Ohana, garden club Ohana, and Women's Club Ohana. The entertainment was a ukulele serenade and hula performance, in which Dee also participated.


