

New Collaboration With Laguna Art Museum

n Tuesday August 29, approximately 70 club members and their invited guests attended a private event at the Laguna Art Museum. This was the first ever collaboration between the Laguna Beach Garden Club and the Laguna Art Museum (LAM) whereby the garden club sponsored two paintings in the current **Joseph Kleitsch**

exhibit. The private event was a celebratory recognition of our sponsorship and new collaboration.



Club President Jane Leary kicked off the gallery talk with opening remarks. Standing in front of the large 60"

x40", luminescent painting *Untitled* (sponsored by the garden club), LAM Executive Director **Julie Perlin Lee**

gave a history of Kleitsch's painting career and his ties to Laguna Beach. She spoke of the gorgeous light in Laguna Beach where gardens thrive as does the art. This LAM exhibit is the largest collection of Kleitsch's paintings ever and holds significance on a national level.

Both Jane and Julie expressed their deep appreciation of the board's decision for sponsorship and of the support of our club members in attending





the event. Julie also hinted at potential collaboration opportunities for future events as the Laguna Beach Garden Club grows in a new direction.



September Speaker

Krystle Hickman The ABC's of Native Bees

rystle Hickman, our featured speaker for our September meeting, is a National Geographic Explorer, conservation photographer, TedX speaker and published bee expert. Her topic for Friday, September 8, 2023 will be *"The ABC's of Native Bees"*. Her boxed set of 100 Native Bees of the Western United States flashcards will be available for purchase at the meeting.



Whenever she is not working on her art or out taking photos, Krystle is self-educating, scouring native bee websites or spending hours at UC Riverside's Entomology Research Museum measuring




arch Museum measuring preserved bee specimens and memorizing their characteristics so that she can better identify them in the wild. There are very few people who are not entomologists taking insect photos, and the list of people willing to take photographs of things that are very small is getting narrower. Krystle

Hickman is a self-taught artist, photographer and community scientist motivated by her passion and curiosity about native California Bees. She drives hundreds of miles in a month capturing images of the four endangered bumble bees. She has become a native bee evangelist, spreading the word about their importance to our environment and their reliance on native plants to survive and thrive.



is an incredibly engaging speaker with a superb story worth hearing as was recently chronicled in a full page spread in the Los Angeles Times earlier this year.

Krystle works with gardens like the Los Angeles County Arboretum and Arlington Garden, regularly photographing and documenting their native habitats. She also collects data on rare bee species in the Mojave Desert, Joshua Tree, Anza-Borrego, the Santa Monica Mountains, yards with native gardens, and more.





Green Day at Sawdust & Succulent Give Away

This year a large group of volunteers gave away succulent cuttings and shared information about the Garden Club at the Sawdust Festival on July 16. High School Scholarships



On Friday, June 2, Jane Leary and Lynn Jax attended the Honors Convocation of Laguna Beach High School to award scholarships of \$3000 each to graduating seniors: Sylvie Henry, Quinn Butler, and Molly Starr, each pursuing a career in Environmental Science, Marine Biology, Environmental Law and other related fields. To the LBHS graduating seniors, over \$400,000 was awarded by 131 groups, including community organizations, businesses, individuals, teachers, alumni, and memorial scholarships. Dear Laguna Beach Garden Club Board of Directors and Club Members:

Finally with the conclusion of Saddleback's Spring term I have the time I've wanted to set aside to write the truly heartfelt thank you to the club. The scholarship money that the club has provided me supports me in more ways than you can know. I apologize ahead of time for the overly long thank you. It is very important to me that you know how much this is life altering for me.

The scholarship, of course, helps fund my classes, textbooks and drafting supplies while attending Saddleback's amazing Sustainable Landscape Design program. It also allows me to take the money I would have used toward school expenses and apply it toward the ongoing therapies for my two children with special needs. I cannot express how much these funds have helped reduce some of the financial strain and worry of finding the means for me to attend school. Thank you for the peace of mind this provides. I will not have to choose between providing for my boys or attending my classes.

Beyond the financial, the fact that you chose to support me in my endeavor is simultaneously humbling and so up lifting. It took several years of nervous contemplation for me to decide to return to school and pursue a new career choice. I knew a school experience this time around would be decidedly different than attending college after high school. I've spent many years as either a full-time caregiver or in part- time jobs to help make ends meet.

Landscape Design was attractive to me because of my background in art/design, my interest in gardening/the outdoors, and in the idea of creating sustainable spaces that enhance and contribute positively to peoples' lives. It is also a profession in which I knew of individuals (mostly women/mothers) who have had highly fulfilling and successful second careers. The nature of the profession can also provide the flexibility needed for family responsibilities an attractive prospect given the realities of my life.

Thank you for your vote of confidence in me. And please know how much consideration and thought I've put into pursuing this career path and my appreciation of your investment in me.

When Mary [Jones, co-Treasurer at the time] presented me with the scholarship check, she said you would all love to know what I am getting up to with school. Here are some of the latest projects I am involved in:

- Just completed my urban farming internship at the Rancho Mission Viejo Farm. I will be going back to volunteer with a few of their kids' educational programs this summer.
- Just completed my final exam in which we were tasked with designing a community garden in an underutilized sloped space at Saddleback College. My design focuses on the concept of a 'the summit'-both in the physical sense of reaching the top of a mountain and metaphorical as attaining a hard-earned goal. I utilized the silhouette of the two peaks that makes up the topography of Saddleback Mountain and is the symbol of Saddleback College in many of the design details. I've sent an image of my final design.
- Stephanie (the other LBGC scholarship recipient) and I are one of several leading the resurgence of the Landscape Design Club at Saddleback. The college gets many requests for design work and this group of students provides free conceptual plans for residential and commercial projects upon request.
- Through the Saddleback Club we have obtained a potential project from the non- profit "Access SoCal," which provides wraparound support for recent US asylum seekers from around the world. If we take on this project, we will help Access SoCal create different outdoor spaces on the property surrounding their newly opened location with a focus on the needs of their varied population.


not park in the church parking lot as our meeting starting and ending times coincide with Pre-school pick-up and drop off.

School Garden Visit


On Wed Wednesday, May 24, many Board members visited two of the three school gardens we support, Top of the World Elementary and El Morro Elementary. **Kelly Osborne** led the tour first beginning at

Top of the World (TOW) to show us the ½ acre plot of land and all it offers to students from kindergarten through 5th grade. There are fruit trees, artichokes plants galore, many raised beds, a demonstration area, teaching spot where students assemble to learn of the day's lesson. The green house is huge and houses a water feature to keep the moisture in and keep the temperature even inside. It is the oldest school garden in Orange County. A recent purchase, thanks to LBGC, is the water fountain. We then carpooled to El Morro where a parent was trimming and cleaning up the area. Their garden is very different and has recently been enlarged. A huge avocado tree looks very healthy but has yet to bear fruit in the past 5



years, so they have no idea what type of tree it is. Wine barrel pots are home to blueberries and other berry plants, even a thornless blackberry bush. A stone owl guards the net-covered raised bed area from overhead predators. We have plans for 2023-2024 to schedule a tour for members of the school gardens.
