

# **Eggciting News For The Laguna Beach Food Pantry**

our empty egg cartons continue to make a difference in the lives of families with food insecurity!

At the December meeting we collected 136 empty egg cartons for the Laguna Food Pantry thanks to you, our generous members, and member Gail Waite who collects them from the local realtors and brings that week's collection to our general meeting. Since September 2023 we've provided 523 egg cartons and saved the Pantry \$235 which they've used for nutritious food for their shoppers, now averaging 165 per day.



When dropping the cartons in December they let me know they can only use cartons with lids (any kind, cardboard or plastic) but not those without lids. Also they no longer use grocery bags so please don't bring those except to carry the cartons in.

To maximize the quantity and minimize the space please stack the cartons like the photo.

No doubt with all the baking you did in December (I certainly did my share to the delight of my neighbors (\*\*) I expect my "little red pony" to be overflowing on January 12!

Way to go, LBGC!! Thanks to you Our Hive is making a difference in the lives of those in need every day.

# **Another Lesson on How to Work Together From our Bee Friends**

ince all of us have just eaten our way through the holiday season, my "bee" story will be an analogy of a Winter bee's life. The winter bees are laid by the queen in the fall; when they are larva, the winter bees are fed a diet that is scarce in protein(pollen)- similar to my "all cookie diet" throughout the month of December! This pollen scarce diet causes the winter bees to develop an extra large 'fat body'- a special insect tissue that regulates metabolism and produces vitellogenin, an amazing substance that enhances the bee's immune system and increased lifespan from 6 weeks to 6 months! Because of the difference in their physiology, they are considered a separate caste of bees unique from the worker, drones and queen.

The winter bees have the special job of keeping the hive alive until Spring. They do this by eating the stored honey and keeping the colony warm by shivering their flight muscles. Consequently, Susan and I feel very justified in having eaten our "sweets heavy" diet through December, in order to sustain the "tour hive" throughout what is the busiest time of the year for the *Gate & Garden Tour*.

We have obtained 4 spectacular major sponsors for the tour (but there is always room for more). Our very own **Mae Ho** and her husband **Morris** have become a major sponsor, Smith Group Real Estate Group and Julia Abel Schwier have returned for their second year, Julie Laughton Luxury Design Build will be a new sponsor and of course our incredible partners at the Laguna Beach County Water District.

**Susan Denton** has decided to help the winter bees by procuring ads from businesses for the tour brochure. # "Why your Perfectly Drought-Tolerant Garden is a Problem"

I came across an article while reading the *LA Times* that I found fascinating and eye-opening, so I thought I would summarize the high points. It was written by Charles Miller, the chair of the Los Angeles chapter of the Climate Reality Projects and its Biodiversity Committee.

"Planting California natives helps with biodiversity but also assists the pollinators, such a native bees, butterflies, moths, and songbirds, and unfortunately California is experiencing a decline in these populations, having lost over 90% of native pollinators.

"Having a drought-tolerant garden is not enough if it only focuses on water use. By introducing exotic plants for ornamental purposes that are seemingly "just as good" as native plants in their water use, what is really happening is that those plants don't help the interconnected flora and fauna adapt to climate change. Though some pollinators will use the blooms of non-native plants as a food source, native pollinators generally rely on native plants to host their caterpillars and other forms of offspring. And often the exotic plants promote the proliferation of invasive insects such as the European honeybee, which drive out native bees and threaten other species. With the additional pressures of climate change, 50% of all species could be lost by the end of the century. Non-native plants don't support local soil chemistry and microbes, native insects, birds, and mammals

"Most of California lies within one of just five temperate biodiversity hot spots on Earth and the only one in North America. There are nearly 7,000 native plants in the biodiverse zone known as the California Floristic Province, many of which have been introduced into horticulture, giving abundant options to us all."

By the way, as beautiful as Jacaranda trees are, they are **NOT** native to California.








# What's New With LBGC Swag?
